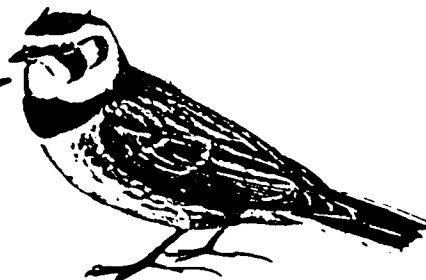

On May 8, 1980, 15 Buff-breasted Sandpipers were observed by Charles and Effie Edwards in a tilled field 6 miles west of Richmon, KS (Anderson Co.). The birds were seen from as close as 20 feet while they fed and displayed.

Report from the Treasurer:

Inflation has finally hit KOS! The time has arrived to consider raising the dues rates to keep ahead of the bill collector. 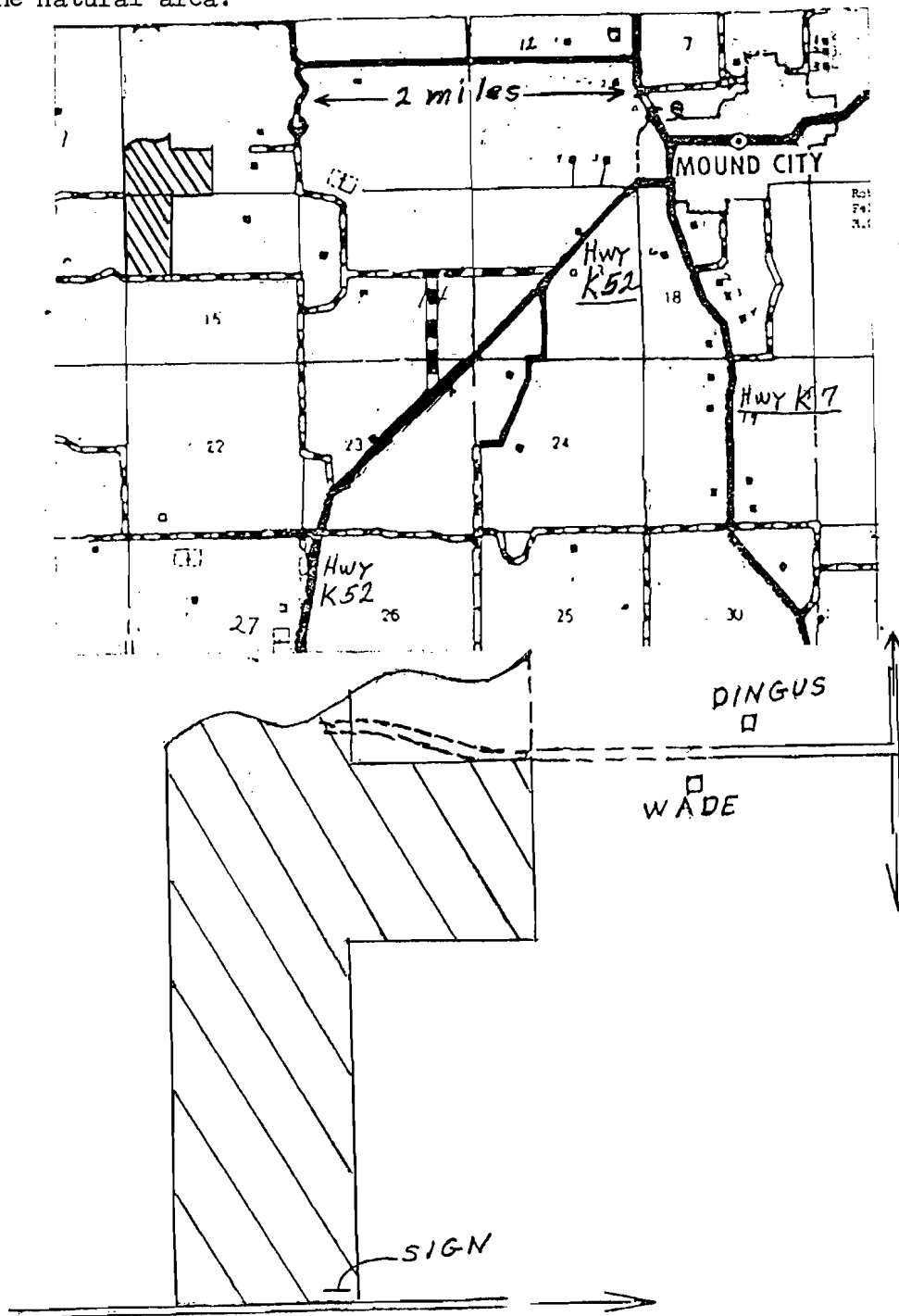

DINGUS NATURAL AREA

Many KOS members and others have asked how to get to the Dingus Natural Area. It is in Linn County not far from Mound City. The maps below should help. The north side is more interesting in some ways since it is closer to Little Sugar Creek and has a heavier cover of eastern hardwoods such as sugar maple. The understory has many interesting plants including ferns. Look for the Pileated Woodpecker as you approach. They are sometimes seen flying to or from the northeast.

If you come to the north side check in with Mr. & Mrs. Wade (KOS members). They will help give further directions and we will have a check on the number of persons visiting the area. If special research is being done be sure to give the kind of study and the number of persons taking part. Send a copy of the findings to John Zimmerman for inclusion in the Newsletter or to Gene Lewis, chairman of the committee. The Wades say camping will be allowed to the north of the area but permission must be personally obtained. No camping in the natural area.



NEW HERON COLONY SITE

The great blue heron colony in Milford Lake near Wakefield, Clay County, has been almost totally abandoned. There were only two nests visible this spring on the site that contained 100 nests six years ago; a year ago there were 12 nests. This colony has been in dead trees for at least ten years; the trees were killed when the lake filled in 1967, and were growing along the banks of the Republican River. When the colony was at its peak, it was almost half a mile long. Wakefield fishermen have reported that the colony was established at least 30 years ago in live trees.

Some of the herons nested this year farther up the lake, where the lake is much narrower, in live and dead trees along the shore. Eight nests were observed in a live sycamore tree about three miles from the former site.

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FALL KOS MEETING

BAKER UNIVERSITY - BALDWIN CITY, KANSAS, OCTOBER 3-5, 1980.

Friday evening gathering 7:30-9:30 p.m. in Holt Art Gallery (main floor) Parmenter Hall (old stone building with flag pole on top). Paper session will be Saturday, October 4 in Owens Musical Arts Building (just west of Parmenter).

Registration will start at 8:00 a.m. with the paper session starting at 9:00 a.m. Lunch will be served in the Student Union. Bird-watcher's Hour will be 1:30 to 2:30 so bring some slides to share. The annual banquet will also be in the Union at 7:00 p.m. followed by the evening speaker. Reservations for Saturday lunch and banquet must be returned by September 26.

Sunday morning field trips are planned for a number of good local spots, including the new Clinton Reservoir just west of Lawrence. It will be interesting to see how this year's drought will affect fall migration.
