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**TWENTY-YEAR INDEX TO THE
KANSAS ORNITHOLOGICAL SOCIETY BULLETIN 2005-2024**

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For this index we followed the standards set by Roger Boyd (2004. Twenty-five Year Index to the Bulletin 1980-2004. KOS Bulletin 55[4]:29-52). This index is published as Numbers 3 and 4 of Volume 75, and it indexes volumes 56 through 75 allowing for easy binding, or referencing online (<https://www.ksbirds.org/kos/bulletin/Bulletin.htm>). This index includes entries for authors, common and scientific names, geographic localities, and a number of special subjects listed below. Avian taxonomy and nomenclature follows the American Ornithologists' Union Checklist of North American Birds (online, 7th edition, 1998) through the 65th supplement (Chesser, R. T., S. M. Billerman, K. J. Burns, C. Cicero, J. L. Dunn, B. E. Hernández-Baños, R. A. Jiménez, Oscar Johnson, A. W. Kratter, N. A. Mason, P. C. Rasmussen, and J. V. Remsen, Jr. 2024. Check-list of North American Birds [online]. American Ornithological Society. <https://checklist.americanornithology.org/taxa/>). Exceptions are when species are not part of the AOU Checklist, we followed Birds of the World (2025. Birds of the World Cornell Lab of Ornithology, <https://birdsoftheworld.org/bow/home>). For bird species we index page numbers with the scientific names, thus all common names reference the scientific name. For non-avian species we provide the common name with the scientific name in parenthesis. When Errata's were published we used the corrected information in the index.

We attempted to index each bird species mentioned in every article, with the exception of Winter Bird Counts (or CBC's), where we only indexed those species mentioned in text narrative and supporting figures or tables, but not within main summary tables for all counts. We did not index pages for localities within CBC summary table, however, all are included as part of the text narrative for those issues.

Subject heading have been broadly defined and include: Abnormalities, Author Instructions, Authors/Names, Banding, Behavior, Counties, Counts and Surveys,

Errata, Food and Feeding Habitat, General, Habitat, Hybrids, KBRC Reports, Locations and Sites, Memoria, Migration, Mortality, Museums, Nesting, Officers of KOS, Records (first), Scientific and Common Names, and Species of Concern. Common acronyms used include: NWR (National Wildlife Refuge); SP (State Park); WA (Wildlife Area); and WMA (Wildlife Management Area).

In addition, we publish one **Errata** here, which is included within the index: Volume 75, Issue 2, page 39, the correct epithet for Fork-tailed Flycatcher in Figure 8 is *savana*, to read as *Tyrannus savana*.

Lastly, we thank Chuck Otte and Sebastian Patti for their reviews and comments on the index, which enhanced the final layout.
