100 years ago in Kansas

In 1910, Charles D.
Bunker¹ wrote and published
an article of his work on locating and studying the
Black-capped Vireo (Vireo
atricappilla), noting:

"In the locality of which I speak, the canyons were about three hundred and twenty feet deep, with outcroppings of gypsum rock from bottom to top, with a strong salt stream running at the bottom....The canyon walls and gulches leading to the canyons were studded with clumps of bushes, mostly dog-wood, scrub-oak and similar shrubs, forming ideal cover for vireos,..."

Having made just a few trips to the Red Hills, the habitat of Schwartz Canyon (Barber County) comes to my mind first. Some still aspire to find but search unsuccessfully for Black-capped Vireo found in this area in the late 19th century. None have been confirmed since then. Most of Bunker's study skins came from Oklahoma, but his collection includes one specimen from Comanche County taken in 1885.

Despite no formal education past grammar school, Bunker trained many great ornithologists and was a curator at the Kansas Museum of Natural History. E. Raymond Hall² noted that Bunker probably would not have published the vireo article without the help of Alexander Wetmore, a former



student at the University of Kansas, who later became Secretary of the Smithsonian.

Kansas winter season roundup

What a season. The headliners for this past winter include swans, raptors, a rare woodpecker and, of course, the weather. Heavy snow caused the cancellation of several Christmas Bird Counts and the generally inclement and extended cold periods probably contributed to the number of CBC participants being substantially below the current decade's average: 476 versus 543. The number of individual birds seen on CBCs was less than one-half of the 10-year average: 3.3 million versus 7.1 million.

Even though the combined CBCs produced only nine swans total, the number of swans seen during the three-month winter period was unprecedented.

Trumpeter Swans were reported from 18 counties in extraordinary numbers starting the first of December and continuing through the end of February. Tundra Swans were less frequently reported than Trumpeters but their numbers by comparison to previous years were impressive.

Perhaps as a result of the snow cover and an increase in the number of, or visibility of voles, reports of Red-tailed Hawks approached the incredible.

Observers reported 118 on the Quivira CBC alone. The combined number of Red-tailed Hawks for the one-month period for CBCs was nearly 3,500, up 46 percent from the previous year.

Bald Eagle numbers and reports were likewise borderline unbelievable. Observers saw 80 on a

single day during the Derby/Belle Plaine CBC on January 6. Pete Janzen reported 67 from Greenwood County on December 22.

Merlin and Prairie
Falcon numbers were off the chart as well. Sightings of the former came from 13 counties and of the latter from 18 counties.

Impressive numbers of


Golden Eagles, Roughlegged Hawks (17 on the Webster Reservoir CBC), Northern Harriers

and Ferruginous Hawks warranted their inclusion in the winter roundup.

A male Williamson's Sapsucker startled Dave Klema on December 5 at Wilson Lake. This was the second record for Kansas in 2009 and only the fourth ever record. The bird was observed off and on through the end of February by many observers. This is most likely the bird of the year for 2009.

Gray Catbirds, Northern
Mockingbirds and Brown Thrashers
didn't seem to mind the cold so
much as to be gone from the state
altogether. Gray Catbirds were
found on two CBCs and one in midJanuary at the Wichita State
University field station reserve near
Viola. Participants on the Derby/
Belle Plaine CBC tallied 11
Northern Mockingbirds. Ten Brown
Thrashers held their ground in
December and January in eight
counties.

Other birds of interest include Barrow's Goldeneye (two reports,



perhaps as many as seven separate birds), Northern Goshawk (two), Franklin's Gull (one), Thayer's Gull (four), Lesser Black-backed Gull (one), Glaucous Gull (seven), Snowy Owl (two), Northern Sawwhet Owl (one), Northern Shrike (approximately 20), Palm Warbler (one), Western Tanager (one), Snow Bunting (three), Rusty Blackbird (808 on the Kanopolis CBC), Brewer's Blackbird (1,000+ from four locations) and Lesser Goldfinch (one).

As it turned out the winter of 2009-2010 was not so bad from a birder's perspective. Tough conditions oftentimes yield good opportunities and good birds. Frankly, I thought given the weather conditions that this past winter would be pretty lackluster. It's good to be pleasantly surprised. Thanks again to all of the people who take the time and trouble to report their birds which become the primary resource material for these reports.

Navigating summer birding perils

Some of my earliest
memories involve playing
outside on the farm under the hot
summer sun. The endless days of
exploring in the yard or along the
creek led to many exciting
discoveries: colorful songbirds,
box turtles, snakes, frogs and itch
-inducing pests.

I still enjoy exploring the outdoors as an adult, but I have become much more aware of situations that lead to overheating or histamine-induced misery. As we head into the summer season, I'd like to share some tips for both beginning and experienced birders.

Beat the heat

•Drink plenty of water and take with you more than you think you'll need. You may want to fill a water bottle three-quarters full and freeze it overnight. In the morning, fill it to the top with water and enjoy an ice-cold drink while you're out birding.

•Wear lightweight, lightcolored clothing to reduce the need for sunscreen. Splurge a little and buy some long-sleeved shirts with mesh ventilation panels and pants that allow you to unzip the legs for shorts. You can also partially unzip the legs to create ventilation without exposing your skin.

•Don't like wearing a lot of fabric? Then cover up with sunscreen or sunblock. Be sure to apply it liberally and frequently.

•Wear a hat with a wide brim. Secure your hat with an adjustable chin strap or head band; otherwise, be prepared to chase it like a tumbleweed across the prairie or mudflats.

Avoid the itch

•Who needs the misery?

Know how to identify poison ivy and don't let any part of the plant touch your skin. If you do get into it, take a cool bath as soon as you can and gently wash off the plant's oil.



•Chiggers
and ticks and
skeeters, oh
my! Use a good insect repellent.
However, avoid getting any
DEET-based product on your
optics because DEET will eat
through the rubber casing.

•An excellent preventive measure for chiggers is powdered sulfur (also known as flowers of sulfur), available at pharmacies. Lightly dust the powder around the openings of your socks, pants and boots. Beware, though: sulfur has an unpleasant odor that may be objectionable to your birding companions. Some users may experience skin irritation.

Sweet relief

•Apply Aloe vera gel to areas of mild sunburn. Taking cool

baths, drinking plenty of water and staying out of the sun will also help make the burn more tolerable.

•If you find yourself experiencing mild itching from chiggers or poison ivy, an oatmeal bath may work wonders in making you more comfortable. Look for 100% colloidal oatmeal bath packets at your local pharmacy. For serious cases, see your physician.

Warning signs

•If you are thirsty, you may already be dehydrated. If you're not able to sweat or if you feel dizzy, you may be in serious trouble. See a physician immediately.

•If a bullseye rash develops anytime at the site of a tick bite, seek medical attention as soon as possible. Be alert to other symptoms associated with Lyme Disease as outlined on this Mayo Clinic web page: http://tinyurl.com/26shkyu.

Being prepared for summer birding will make it that much more enjoyable. Once you develop your own arsenal of misery-fighting methods, battling the summer perils will become less of a challenge. You'll be able to spend your energy focusing on the finer details of plumage rather than worrying that the crawling sensation on your calf is really a tick.

Avian Conservationist of the Year Award

The Kansas Ornithological Society's Avian Conservationist of the Year Award is given to an individual who makes significant contributions to bird conservation and/or education. Nominations should be made for outstanding work in bird conservation through the management or preservation of habitats, education, or research.

A nominee may be any

professional, volunteer, educator, or other person who has accomplished significant contributions in any of the areas listed. The nominee does not have to be a member of KOS, but the nominator must be a current member of KOS. The accomplishments should reflect a long-time commitment to bird conservation and/or education within the state of Kansas. This

award will be presented at the annual fall KOS meeting.


